### The DOLLS of MOUNTAINSIDE

In 1895, the Coles Memorial Home for Orphans was founded on the site of Brighton Gardens on what is now Route 22. It was a summer home for the children of the Newark Orphan Asylum and could accommodate 125 children. Among these children was Irene Sterzinger who wrote in a letter dated 1995:

At the end of the school year, we were bused to Mountainside, singing all the way! We hiked to the reservation to swim in Lake Surprise on hot days. One day a week, we hiked to Westfield to go to the Woolworth's 52010 where we had a difficult time trying to decide what we should buy with the nickel that was given to us to spend. There was an old barn on the property in which the gardener kept his tools and was used for other storage. We ate home-grown vegetables all summer. We enjoyed picnics on the grounds every Saturday night, complete with campfire, marshmallows, and of course, with lots of singing. The children attended Sunday School at the Mountainside Union Chapel (now, the Mountainside Gospel Chapel). We were always invited to join the

Sunday School for their annual summer picnic and also joined them on excursions, by train, to Ocean Grove and Asbury Park. We wore our Sunday clothes to church and our black bloomers, blue sailor blouses with a black tie and sneakers during the week. We entertained our neighbors and church members with a play or a talent show at the end of summer. Our Executive Director, Miss Anna M. Petersen, has enriched our lives through her love and tender care, and Mountainside played an important role in the lives of all of us. After completing Business School in New York City, I left the "NOA" (Newark Orphans Asylum) and sometime later, I married and we built our house on Bridle Path in Mountainside. -Irene B. Sterzinger

Mrs. Sterzinger donated a collection of handmade foreign dolls which were made by the "junior-aged" children from the Newark Orphan Asylum. This collection features approximately 21 handmade dolls dressed in different traditional costumes from a variety of nations. The dolls were entered into a 1939 Newark Civic Club competition and won 3<sup>rd</sup> prize in the Junior Crafts category. The dolls are now on display at the Deacon Andrew Hetfield House.

BRICK FUNDRAISER: To purchase bricks for the next dedication, please pick up a flyer at the Mountainside Library, Borough Hall or go to www. mountainsidehistory.org. The next brick dedication will take place on Veterans' Day in November of 2013. These bricks make up the path leading to the front door of the Hetfield House. The MHPC began this walkway to raise funds to write and publish an updated history book of our Borough's history from 1945 to present. Now that the book has been published, the Committee will continue to sell bricks to raise funds for the upkeep of the Hetfield House.

The original Children's Country Home was the house on the corner of New Providence Road and Mountain Avenue (now the site of Patterson Interiors and formerly Barrett & Crane Realtors). The home originally housed eight "underprivileged" children during the summer before it became a year-round home for "handicapped" children in 1897. Over the years, this home evolved and eventually merged with what is now, Children's Specialized Hospital.

Recently, the house has been under contract for sale. The current owner has agreed to donate the house structure for Mountainside's historic preservation; but, it must be moved to another location.
