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A Tale of Two HOUSES

On November 2, 2013, a historic event took place in Mountainside when the Levi Cory House was moved from the corner of New Providence Road and Mountain Avenue to Constitution Plaza next to the Deacon Andrew Hetfield House and across from the Mountainside Library.

On June 29, 1985, another historic event took place in Mountainside. The Deacon Andrew Hetfield House was moved from NJ State Route 22 West to Constitution Plaza near the Mountainside Library.

Both houses have earned their place in Mountainside's history (and the history of Westfield and the West Fields of Elizabeth before Mountainside formed in 1895). It is fitting to discuss the histories of these storied homes during this 350th anniversary of the founding of New Jersey.

Let's begin with the older Deacon Andrew Hetfield House which began in 1760 as the home of Deacon Andrew Hetfield. Andrew Hetfield was a deacon in the Presbyterian Church of Westfield. The original structure was a two-story, two room house - a kitchen on the first floor and a sleeping loft on the second floor. As the Hetfield family grew, so did the home. Two additions during the early and late nineteenth century resulted in a grand 10-12 room home.

Andrew's son-in-law, who lived in the house until 1853, was the Revolutionary War hero, Abraham Clark. The Hetfield House remained in the Hetfield family until 1946 when it was purchased by Walda Rosencrantz who ran the "Dutch Oven" antiques business there until 1984. In 1984, the house was purchased by

developers who gave it to the Borough of Mountainside and it was moved by the Mountainside Historic Preservation Committee in 1985. It is believed to have been moved to land that was originally part of Deacon Andrew Hetfield's property.

Once moved in 1985, it took several years for the Committee to restore it so it was fit to be used as a meeting place and museum for Mountainsiders. Scott Daniels, Chairman of the Mountainside Restoration Committee says that "the Hetfield House was actually in pretty bad condition, worse than the Levi Cory House is in now." Thanks to donations and grants, the Hetfield House is now a jewel for Mountainsiders to enjoy.

The Levi Cory House is believed to have been built in 1810-1818. Searches of public records have been unable to pinpoint the exact year it was built. It may have been originally owned by the Woodruff family who were prominent local landowners and among the earliest settlers in the area.

The most important event to occur in the Levi Cory House was during 1892-1896

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when the house was rented out by thenowner, Levi Cory, to a group of volunteers for use as the Children's Country Home. The Home was the summer residence of children who came to the "country" for a respite from their harsh living conditions in New York City. During the first summer, nearly 60 children spent two weeks at a time enjoying the fresh air and recreation that the West Fields and Mountainside offered.

During the first summer, many of these children were found to have various medical conditions which required care by volunteer nurses and doctors from the area. A local newspaper at the time stated: "The Home has entertained this season nearly sixty children many of whom were sick and miserable when they came. All were greatly improved by their stay here and seemed to appreciate the kindness and care given them."

Since the ailing children's health improved with the care they received at the Children's Country Home, it was decided that the home would house children with medical needs in subsequent summers. In 1896, possibly due to the death of Levi Cory in 1895, the Children's Country Home needed to relocate. CCH volunteers had been saving money in a Building Fund and were able to purchase the neighboring Thomas Drew farmstead, occupying ten acres of nearby land on New Providence Road.

In 1962, the Children's Country Home was renamed Children's Specialized Hospital which remains today on New Providence Road and is currently the nation's largest comprehensive children's rehabilitation system.

Since the Children's Country Home relocated after 1896, the Levi Cory House was owned by various prominent families in Mountainside which became independent from Westfield in 1895. More recently, the house was the site of various businesses such as Barrett & Crain Realtors and Patterson Interiors. In 2013, the building was purchased by developers who, under an agreement with the previous owner, Dick Scott, agreed to give the historic structure to the Mountainside Restoration Committee to move.

The YEAR in REVIEW

SPRING & FALL PLANT SALES: Sales of beautiful Spring plants were held in May and a Fall mum plant sale was held in September.

WINE & CHEESE RECEPTION: A wine and cheese reception was held at the Hetfield House on Tuesday, June 11, 2013 to kick-off the fund raising and promotion for the Levi Cory House move.

SUMMER KICK-OFF BARBECUE DINNER DANCE: On Friday, June 28, Our Lady of Lourdes' Pollard Hall was the site of a lively and well-attended Barbecue Dinner Dance held to raise funds for the Levi Cory House move.

GOLF OUTING AT ECHO LAKE COUNTRY CLUB: A beautiful day on Monday, July 29 helped make the Levi Cory House fund raising golf outing a huge success.

OLD & NEW AND CHRISTMAS, TOO BOUTIQUE: On Saturday, November 23, the Hetfield House was the site of a Holiday Boutique featuring the debut of "The Village Shop." Many shoppers enjoyed the unique holiday items and curiosities offered.

GINGERBREAD OPEN HOUSE: Gingerbread Open Houses were held on Saturday and Sunday, December 14-15, 2013. Adults were invited on a snowy Saturday afternoon for Holiday Cheer and Sing-Along with Santa accompanied by music from RMC Studios of Garwood. Sunday's open house hosted families and hundreds of people visited the house to enjoy music, crafts, delicious holiday treats, hot cider, a beautiful display of our community's talents at Gingerbread Creations and Mr. and Mrs. Claus. Performers included the Deerfield School Middle School music students and the Children's Choir from Our Lady of Lourdes Church.

The Borough of Mountainside agreed to allow the house to be moved to Borough property on Constitution Plaza adjacent to the Mountainside Library and Hetfield House. After a monumental fundraising effort, the Levi Cory House was moved on November 2, 2013. In the future, after foundation work and extensive restoration, the Levi Cory House is planned to be the home of a boutique and a museum devoted to saving and recording the history of various children's organizations in Mountainside.
