### HARRY DEVLIN - Mountainside's ARTIST TREASURE

On Thursday, March 22, the Mountainside Restoration Committee held a reception honoring the late Harry Devlin and unveiling his painting entitled *Queen Anne Spring* which was recently acquired by the Committee. During the early part of the reception, Devlin's daughter, Wende Devlin-Gates and son, David Devlin, spoke about growing up in Mountainside in the famous Devlin family. March 22, 2018, would have been Harry Devlin's 100<sup>th</sup> birthday.

Harry Devlin and his wife Wende moved from Elizabeth, NJ to their 19<sup>th</sup> Century Mountainside Victorian farmhouse, set back on Hillside Avenue, in 1950. They raised seven children in Mountainside and resided here for over 50 years. After long illnesses, Harry died in 2001 and Wende passed, tenmonths later, in 2002.

Harry was a member of the Mountainside Restoration Committee and was instrumental in helping to save and move the Deacon Andrew Hetfield House in 1985. He also created the line drawing of the Hetfield House which is now used on this newsletter masthead and in many of the Committee's publications and letterhead. Limited signed and numbered copies of his Hetfield House

portrait were donated to Mountainside and sold as a fundraiser during Mountainside's Centennial Celebration in 1995. Wende and Harry Devlin served as Grand Marshals of the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration parade.

In the talk by siblings Wende and David, during the unveiling reception, they shared memories of a loving, fun and bustling childhood growing up with their work-from-home parents on a three-acre "farm" in Mountainside. They spoke of their menagerie of animals on the property, including their donkey named Eliza Doolittle – also known as the "Burro" of Mountainside. Eliza escaped often and was frequently found wandering around Mountainside and Westfield.

Harry worked from his carriage house studio on the property which was filled with his and Wende's renderings, commendations and awards and was always open to visitors. Wende was also a prolific artist and author. Both Harry and Wende worked together as author and illustrator on many projects including the syndicated comic strip called "Full House" - later renamed "Raggmopp" (after the family poodle). The comic strip was based on their life with seven children. They also co-wrote and illustrated more than 20 children's books including the "Old Black Witch!" (which later became a movie) and two sequels, "How Fletcher Was Hatched", "The Cranberry" series, "To Grandfather's House We Go: A Roadside Tour of American Homes" and "What Kind of House is That?".

Harry Devlin has been an artist in many arenas as painter, illustrator, cartoonist, photographer, and architecture expert. While serving in the

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Navy during WWII, Devlin was an illustrator of enemy planes which helped Naval intelligence. After the war, he worked for ten years with Collier's Weekly as an illustrator. He also illustrated for the Saturday Home Magazine and the New York Daily News.

Following his dismissal from the New York Daily News, after he refused to draw a pro-McCarthy cartoon, Devlin continued working privately as a painter and an illustrator of comic strips, advertising and children's books.

His paintings were largely devoted to architecture-especially Victorian architecture. His painting style results from a technique similar to photo-realism. He would alter slide images to define his basic composition, but incorporated "high truths" by removing offending items such as telephone poles, wires, automobiles and other buildings in order to create a nostalgic mood. His book on the subject of architecture entitled "Portraits of American Architecture: Monuments to a Romantic Mood, 1830-1900" has become a major source of information on architecture.

Through his career, Devlin was bestowed numerous honors and awards including the National Cartoonist Society Advertising and Illustration Award for 1956, 1962 and 1963; their Illustration Award for 1977 and 1978; and their Magazine and Book Illustration Award for 1990. Harry and Wende were awarded the Syracuse University's highest

award for alumni – the Arendts Award. Harry was awarded an honorary doctorate of humanities from Kean University and a Presidential citation from Rutgers University.

Besides being an active and revered member of the Mountainside Restoration Committee, Harry was a member of the New Jersey Council on the Arts and the New Jersey Committee for the Humanities, a trustee of the Morris Museum, Vice-Chairman of President Eisenhower's "People to People" committee and President of the National Cartoonists Society. He has designed stamps for the U.S. Postal Service and a license plate to honor New Jersey history for the NJ Motor Vehicle Commission.

The cake served during the March 22 unveiling event read: "Celebrating the 100<sup>th</sup> Birthday of Harry Devlin...His Art Lives on Forever". We are fortunate to have his painting hanging

# WATTS FOUNDATION provides grant to restore Levi Cory house porch

The circa 1818 Levi Cory House, now at Constitution Plaza adjacent to the Hetfield House, will soon have one of the original porches restored thanks to a grant from the Watts Mountainside Community Foundation. A photo from the early years of the house shows it had porches on two sides of the building which the Committee hopes to restore.

Thanks to the Watts Foundation, one of these porches will soon be built. The Committee also expects heat and electricity to be up and working soon which will allow for a Certificate of Occupancy to be granted so the Levi Cory House can open to the public. It is planned as a museum for Children's interests and a consignment shop.

The Watts Foundation also granted funds during early 2017 to repair and paint the interior first floor walls of the Levi Cory House.
