#### Hetfield House room features VETERAN memorabilia

Mountainside has its own history of World War II and it's not in the Library, although you can see it from there. It is an archive that resides in an upper room within the Hetfield House, just across Constitution Plaza. Walk into that small room and you can almost hear the rumble of artillery, the drone of aircraft, and the crack of small arms fire as you are surrounded by the memorabilia of that turbulent era decades ago. More wars would follow and bits and pieces of those conflicts are here too.

Yellowing copies of old newspapers follow the tide of war from the early '40s with stories of local boys caught up in the maelstrom. Fading magazines like Life, Time, and others bring the war home in pictures. A plaque honors Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 10136 for a membership drive and a large notebook carries letters and other Post business. On the WWII home front, civilians were sharing the war's impact through food and fuel rationing and a couple of example ration books reside behind glass frames. A single set of dog tags rests beside them. An Honor Roll lists the Mountainsiders serving their country.

All of this from six decades ago, as time takes its toll on memories. But those who served will never be forgotten; constantly reminding us that freedom is not free.

Much of the material in this room was gathered and preserved by Dick Tims, since deceased. As he passed, so did his dedication to this archive and it remains much the same over the years.

Bob Farley, currently with the Mountainside Borough Public Works, and VFW Post 10136 Commander, picked up the mission but readily admits that it has fallen on neglected times. He says, "We are encouraging our citizens to either loan or donate items from their own families veterans to help round out our collection. It can help tell the story of

how Mountainsiders contributed to all the wars including WWII. Also we are looking for glass display cases to better preserve our collection and to keep it secure."

The Library of Congress has a program titled Veterans History Project that collects stories from veterans for archiving. It estimates that between 1500 and 2000 veterans are passing every day and their stories pass with them. The Borough of Mountainside is doing its small part in preserving wartime history.

A portrait of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, WWII wartime President, looks out from a wall of this small sanctuary. He seems to be contemplating how quickly we forget and how little we learn from the horror of wars repeated.

For a step back into history, visit this room the next time you are at the Hetfield House and let your imagination transport you back to how it was then, and add a silent prayer for all those fallen soldiers.

explanation (1-2 pages) concerning their brick for the Hetfield House's "brick scrapbook." Write-ups may be mailed or dropped off at borough hall, Attn: Hetfield The Mountainside Historic House. Preservation Committee thanks all who have supported our brick program by purchasing bricks for this "Walk of History." To purchase bricks for the next dedication, please pick up a flyer at the Mountainside Library, Borough Hall or go to www.mountainsidehistory.org. The next brick dedication will take place in the fall of 2010. Through the sale of these bricks which make up the path leading to the front door of the Hetfield House, the MHPC is raising funds to write and publish an updated history book of our Borough's history from 1945 to present. The original History of Mountainside by Jean Hesketh-Hershey covers the history until 1945 (copies are available for \$5 each, call 789-9420).

TV-35's WELCOME TO THE HETFIELD HOUSE: The third episode of "Welcome to the Hetfield House" was produced and aired for TV35 in the spring of 2008. Entitled "Jane" and narrated by Don Jeka, it features psychic and ghost investigator, Jane Doherty. Ms. Doherty guides the viewer through the house as she describes her feelings about the presence of ghost activity in the Deacon Andrew Hetfield House. Copies of the DVD may be borrowed from the Mountainside Library or viewed at the Hetfield House during Open House events.

HETFIELD HOUSE NOTECARDS FOR SALE: Classic ivory-colored, folded note cards are available for sale in sets of twelve with envelopes. They feature the Harry Devlin sketch of the Hetfield House on the front with a brief history on the back. The inside is blank. Anyone interested in purchasing these cards can do so at Borough Hall or stop by the Hetfield House during any open house or event. They are being sold for \$7.00 per set of twelve and make a great gift or stocking stuffer!

SCHEDULED OPEN HOUSES: Generally, the Hetfield House is open to the public during most months from September through June, on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday from 1:00 to 3:00 pm. The public is invited during these times to tour the house and gain insight into Mountainside's historic past.

They were: 1st Place - Anjali Mehrotra for her Apple Pecan Crumb Pie; 2<sup>nd</sup> Place - Joan Barna for her Peachy Butterscotch Pie; and 3rd Place - Art Mezzo (8th grade) for his Autumn Cranberry-Pear Pie.
