From the CHAIRMAN'S INKWELL

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MISSION STATEMENT

The Mountainside Restoration Committee, Inc. was established in 1985 to preserve the Borough's links to the past. The premier venues are the Deacon Andrew Hetfield House (circa 1760) and the Levi Cory House (circa 1818), both restored and continually maintained by this Committee. These volunteers strive to focus attention on Mountainside's heritage through tours, newsletters, videos and many events during the year. This mission includes maintaining the Hetfield House and Levi Cory House properties in perpetuity and saving/archiving artifacts and documents important to Mountainside's history.

LEVI CORY...The HOUSE and the MAN

On November 2, 2013, a house was moved from the corner of New Providence Road and Mountain Avenue in Mountainside to Constitution Plaza near the Mountainside Library and the Deacon Hetfield House. This house, believed to have been built in 1818, was given the name - The Levi Cory House. Levi Cory was a man who owned this house during its period of historical significance. In the 1890's, Levi Cory rented his house to a group of humanitarian ladies who would bring children from the inner cities of Newark and New York to spend a few weeks in the 'country.' It was during this time, that Mountainside was in the process of separating from Westfield becoming an independent borough, officially, in 1895.

In these summers, when the children visited The Children's Country Home, caretakers noticed that many of them suffered from various ailments and the time they spent in the Mountainside/Westfield area helped them heal. As summers passed, the ladies along with local doctors and nurses, who tended to the children, decided that the home should be solely used for inner-city children who needed medical care. The need grew and the Levi Cory House proved too

small to accommodate the larger numbers of children and the Children's Country Home was moved to a larger property further down New Providence Road. In the 1960's, the Children's Country Home was renamed the Children's Specialized Hospital which is still located, today, at its relocated home on New Providence Road.

The Mountainside Restoration Committee, Inc. raised the funds needed to move this important house because it was slated for demolition. Richard Scott, the house's last owner, in agreement with the developer who had purchased the property, donated the house to the Committee. It was subsequently moved to Constitution Plaza, onto property owned by the Borough of Mountainside.

Levi Cory, the man, was primarily a farmer and an elected surveyor of highways. An 1882 newspaper article stated that Levi was President of the 'Westfield Thief Detective Society.' 'This society is in a flourishing condition and ready when called upon to do active service to pursuit of thieves." The society was the precursor of what later became the police department.

Cory was born in 1819 and died in 1895 at the age of 76. It is unclear if he ever lived in the Levi Cory House. He was married to Harriet B. Clark from Rahway. Levi was the son of William Cory who died in 1866 and left the family's home to Levi. The family house, today, is known as the Miller-Cory House Museum of Westfield. Levi, his wife and daughter lived in the Miller-Cory house until he died in 1895 leaving the house to his daughter, Theresa. Theresa was the last Cory to own the Miller-Cory House. It is believed that Harriet sold the Levi Cory House after her husband's death. Harriet died in 1903 at the age of 84. Theresa died in 1923 in Los Angeles, and is buried in Fairview Cemetery along with her parents, Levi and Harriet.

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LEVI CORY

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The Cory Coat of Arms from Scotland. The motto reads 'Forti Tene Manu" (hold with a firm hand).

The Corys were originally

from Scotland. Levi, who was a registered Republican, served as a member of the

Westfield Township Committee and was an elder in the Presbyterian Church of Westfield.

Levi died in early 1895; he never witnessed the official birth of the Borough of Mountainside later that year. His cousin, Joseph Cory, was the first Mayor of Mountainside.

The Mountainside Restoration Committee's Levi Cory House was opened to the public in December of 2018 after five years of renovation and restoration. Several additional restoration projects will begin soon, which will include the addition of two porches which were once a part of the house. The first

porch will be built thanks to a grant from the Watts Mountainside Community Foundation. The house now serves as a museum for Mountainside Children's interests and home to the Village Shop which is open on a limited schedule - tentatively, the second and fourth Friday/Saturday each month. Visit the Hetfield House on Sunday, April 7, 2019 for a very special interpretive presentation...

"MAIZIE BREWS A TEA BUSINESS"

On Sunday afternoon, April 7, 2019 at 1–3pm, the Mountainside Restoration Committee will host 'Maizie Brews a Tea Business,' a dramatic presentation, brought to us in conjunction with the Public Scholars Project of The New Jersey Council for the Humanities, at the Deacon Andrew Hetfield House. Guests will be entertained as Maizie discusses her experiences as a woman in 1925 opening her own business – a Tea Room. Ironically, the Deacon Andrew Hetfield House once operated as a Tea Room during prohibition.

What if it was 1925 and you wanted to open a Tea Room? What if you were a woman who wanted to open a business? In this dramatic presentation, Maizie Stanton will explain how her husband reacted and what she needed to do to prepare for this undertaking. During this session, the challenges faced by women who were stepping out of their homes and into the business world will be explored. Participants will engage in a lively discussion about the Tea Room craze and the evolution of women as entrepreneurs.

Maizie is brought to life by Maureen O'Connor Leach who has been a historic interpreter for over 25 years and has presented a variety of programs at historic sites throughout the country. She is a member of the New Jersey Living History Advisory Council and a Commissioner for the Monmouth County Historical Commission. Ms. Leach holds a BA in History and a JD.
